### 3. Testing and reporting requirements

Under the *Quarantine, Isolation and Other Obligations Order*, the *Prohibition of Entry Order*, and the *Transport Canada Interim Order*, cruise lines and passengers will need to adhere to strict requirements for testing at key checkpoints, and are required to report back to the Government of Canada.

- Crew and passengers must be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 EXCEPTION: Children under 12 and medical contraindication. Religion belief only for Canadians.
- Crew and passengers are required to self-monitor for symptoms
- Passengers must take a COVID-19 molecular test within 72-hours before boarding a cruise ship OR take an antigen test within one day of boarding a cruise ship
- Passengers must take a COVID-19 molecular test within 72-hours before arriving in Canada OR an antigen test within one day of the scheduled arrival.
